

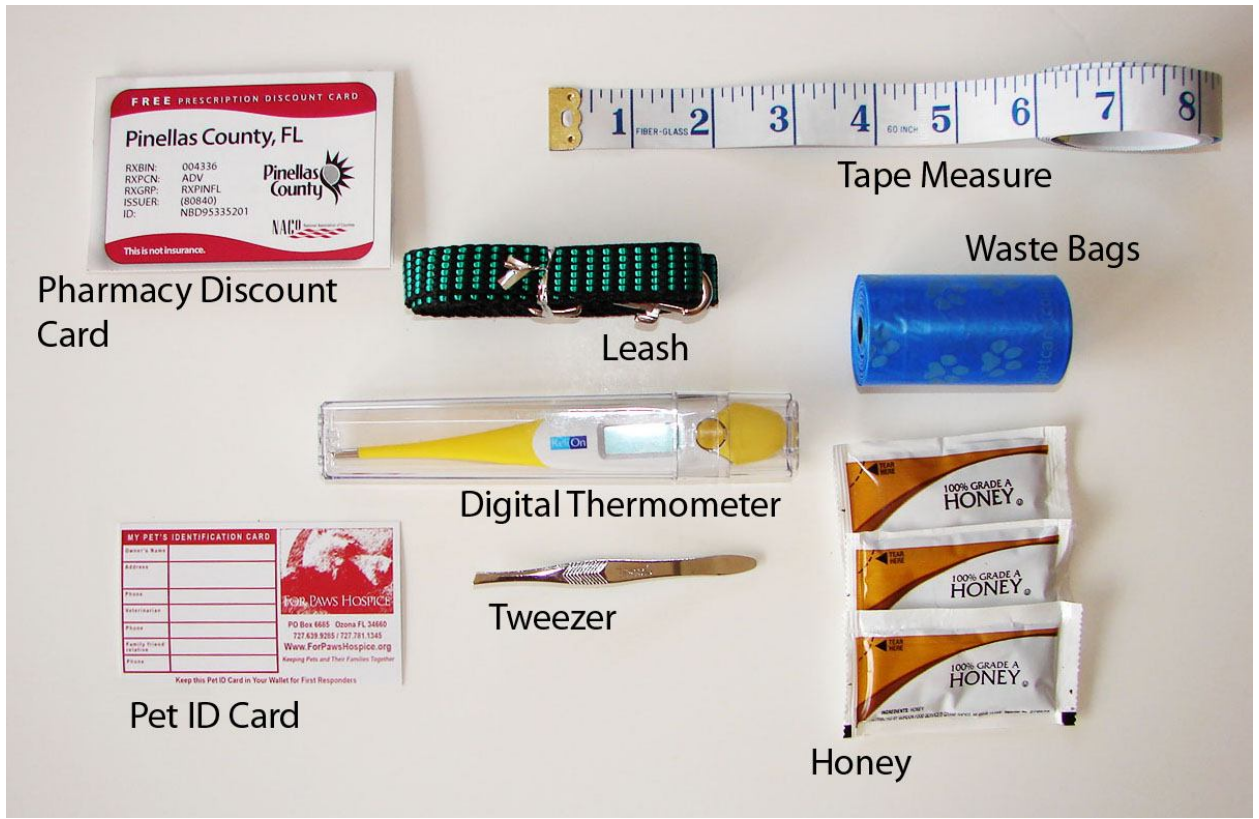
Anatomy of a First Aid Kit

A well-stocked first aid kit is a handy thing to have for people and pets. To be prepared for emergencies, keep a first aid kit in your home and in your car. Carry a first aid kit with you or know where you can find one. Find out the location of first aid kits where you work. First aid kits come in many shapes and sizes. You can purchase one from the Red Cross Store or your local pharmacy.

You may also make your own. Some kits are designed for specific activities, such as hiking, camping or boating. Whether you buy a first aid kit or put one together, make sure it has all the items you may need. Include any personal items such as medications and emergency phone numbers or other items your health-care provider may suggest. Check the kit regularly. Make sure the flashlight batteries work. Check expiration dates and replace any used or out-of-date contents. The following list provides all you should need for a basic pet first aid kit:

- Absorbent compress dressings
- Adhesive surgical cloth tape
- Stretch gauze bandages
- Antibiotic ointment
- Antiseptic wipe packets
- 1 Blanket (space blanket)
- 1 Instant cold compress
- 1 Pair of non-latex gloves
- 3 100% pure honey packets
- Bandage scissors
- Roller bandages various widths
- Sterile gauze pads
- Telfa pads
- Coagulant powder
- Liquid bandage
- Digital thermometer
- Tongue depressors
- Cotton swabs
- Cloth tape measure
- LED flashlight
- Leash
- Tweezers
- 3% Hydrogen peroxide
- 9% Sodium chloride
- Bottled drinking water
- Hand sanitizer
- Pet waste bags
- Large waste bag & clamp
- Pet CPR instructions
- Pet ID card
- Prescription discount card
- Measured syringe
